
Bug Facts

- Bug Talk provides education about diseases we can get from the bite of an infected mosquito, tick or other 'bug' to companies and organizations.
- With no vaccines for most of these illnesses, the best defense is education about how to avoid them.
- There are likely over one hundred of these germs that can infect humans; generally 5 to 10 are frequently mentioned like West Nile, Lyme Disease, Malaria and Rocky Mountain Fever.
- The names of other infections are now becoming more well -known as they become more commonly known diseases in the US. These include dengue, chikungunya, Eastern Equine Enceophalitis, Alpha Gal syndrome and Jamestown Canyon. Still other germs specifically infect domestic and farm animals and wildlife such as avian flu.
- Bug diseases account for some 17% of all new infectious diseases are bug diseases; one in every two persons in the Americas are at risk of being infected.
- Bug diseases are part of a larger group of diseases called zoonotic illnesses, meaning they are transferred from animals to humans.
- The World Health Organization (WHO) reports that 80% of the world's population live in areas that put them at risk for contracting one major vector disease.
- These illnesses are growing in numbers and strength fueled by climate change and rising temperatures as they spread to new geographic areas in this country and around the world.

*While the term 'bug' is not the scientific nomenclature for all invertebrates and vectors, it is useful terminology for public conversations.
